Let's Get Growing!

When you're hungry, you probably open your refrigerator to find at least a couple of things inside. And your cupboards likely have at least a few odds and ends sitting on the shelves. Most of us don't think twice about where our next meal will come from. And if we *don't* have enough, our neighbors, family, friends or local agencies can lend a hand.

That's not the case in Haiti. Years of drought, punishing hurricanes, and decades of deforestation have taken a toll on Haiti's soil. As a result, parents struggle to grow enough food for their families.



Entire communities live hand-to-mouth, unsure of how to produce sustainable, adequate food sources.

But here at Shipwrecked VBS we want to change that!



Operation Kid-to-Kid is partnering with World Vision to provide Haitian families with drought-tolerant seeds—enough to grow food for the *entire* family, with additional crops to sell in community markets. Donations also help farmers learn sustainable farming practices, contribute toward reforestation, and help nourish entire communities for years to come! A \$10 gift provides seeds that can grow into food that will feed a child for an entire year and *any* donation makes a difference! We will be collecting money in "Seed Packets" during VBS July 16 -19. You can help NOW, during VBS until August 12. Add whatever you can to the

Through 50 hours of thorough training, Stephen Ministers learn how to provide appropriate care to others. Stephen Ministers repeatedly say that training helps them grow in their faith, and strengthens relationships with family and friends.

Stephen ministry training will take place on Tuesdays from 6:00 -8:30 pm starting August 21. Multi-week breaks will occur

Announcing an "Adult Forum": Ancient Wisdom For An Anxious Church



In these times of political unrest and social upheaval, even our denomination is not immune. Anxiety, therefore, plagues many people of faith and infects many churches' internal cultures. We are committed to making sure that Wesley Memorial UMC does not become one of these "anxious churches"! So we are turning to our favorite source of guidance: the Bible. Galatians, specifically. This summer, we'll hear from the book of Galatians from the pulpit, as well as from a new book from Duke Divinity School Dean, Elaine Heath, *God Unbound: Wisdom from Galatians for the Anxious Church*. From July 8 through August 19, Pastors Jeff, Jared, and Erin will rotate teaching this book Sunday mornings during the Sunday School hour (9:45-10:45). This seven-week series will culminate with Dean Heath herself coming to preach on August 26 at 9:45 and 11:00 (the 8:30 services are cancelled that day). Remembering the Music

Several years ago my husband, John, was diagnosed with Alzheimer's. At first there was denial, perhaps his symptoms were related to normal aging or some "senior moment," but over time more cognitive issues were evident. Each day brought new challenges and overwhelming responsibility. I searched for answers on where to turn and how to cope with our new life. My gregarious, outgoing and fun loving husband was now quiet and reserved. The disease took so much from us. However, it did not take John's love of music and his affection for his family and me. One day while riding in the car and listening to Joy FM on the radio, he asked me to marry him, again. I said "yes", of course.

About this same time my siblings and I had to move our dear mother from

her home and into a care facility. Mother was 90 and her dementia had progressed and she was beginning to wander from her home. I felt so much guilt, like I had somehow failed as a daughter. My mother was the most giving person I ever knew. To see so much taken from her was heartbreaking.

I was going through a maze of unchartered territory. What kept me going was my faith and the music. John and mother both loved music. John had sung in church choir since he was a boy and mother played piano and had been church organist. They were both at Carriage House in Greensboro at different times. I would push the wheelchair into the piano room, grab an old hymnal and start playing. Other residents would slowly come around and join in. "Amazing Grace or "When the Saints Go Marching In." Truly amazing! Their joyous spirits came to life! It was an uplifting time and always brightened my day. I've read there is a part of the brain that is not affected by the disease and that's why they respond to music. I believe it is the Holy Spirit living and thriving in God's children. The Lord has told us he would be with us, even until the end. I was witness to this! It was and still is a great comfort to me.

I grieve their loss, but I consider those last years a gift. I hold on to the good times, the music, and the memories. I was blessed to be a caregiver. My message to others who are caring for a loved one with cognitive issues - know you are not alone. Others have traveled this path and share in your journey. Sometimes we just need the listening ear of a friend, someone who has walked the road before.
